

Highlights Security & Public Safety

- Over **317,336** business contacts by our Patrol Officers & **1,893** Arrest
- Implemented a Crime Prevention Program to educate business owners and employees about safety and steps they can take to have a safer environment
- Creation of Public Safety Committee
- Implemented regular Law Enforcement Meetings to coordinate between the **10** different Agencies that serve the Greater Northside
- Implemented a Proactive Patrol Hot Spot Initiative to address targeted hot spot zones on **July 2019** that has led to **13,085** additional Business Checks and Trespass Warnings

- Abated more than 27,245 sites of graffiti
- Coordinated over **12** murals and **13** mini-murals
- Coordinated **3** sculpture
- Creation of Artist Meet and Greet Gatherings 2015
- Currently have **298** trees in the Right of Way —with Trees for Houston
- Implemented an ongoing and effective litter abatement program in the right of way (ROW), including mowing, removal of debris, tire removal, and more
 - Over **1,163** Tons equivalent to over **2,327,315** pounds of trash/debris collected
 - Over **17,531** tires collected
 - District H Tire & Illegal Dumping Partnership Council Member Karla Cisneros– Since July 2019, GNMD has abated 4,252 tires and 972,000 lbs of trash







Greater Northside Business Revitalization- THRIVE

With our community partner Avenue, and the assistance of Cultura Codes, over 25 businesses were selected to receive mentors, classes, and one on one assistance after COVID.





Special Projects and Capital Improvements

- The District has invested or committed \$679,330 in funding to leverage \$7,093,533 in additional funding from federal, public, non-profit, private and other investment partners in the District.
- By 2022, multiple projects will be completed in the District worth \$7,670,864 in value.

Quitman Pedestrian-Transit Improvements

The Quitman St. Partnership Project includes pedestrian and bike improvements from Houston Ave to Elysian St. anticipated date of completion by end of 2023. The project was selected by GNMD Capital Improvement Program Committee


After the partnership agreement occurred with the following agencies, the budget includes:

- Commissioner Adrian Garcia Precinct 2 Pedestrian Improvements -\$3,400,000
- Greater Northside Management District GNMD/Federal Transit
 Authority Grant Pedestrian Improvements -\$1,999,000
- METRO On-Street Bike Lanes \$365,000
- City of Houston On-Street Bike Lanes and Mill and Overlay Funding \$815,000





Quitman Pedestrian-Transit Improvements




- Pedestrian Improvements Project from South St. to Gano St. (0.8 miles).
- In 2015, GNMD received a Federal grant from Houston Galveston Area Council (H-GAC).
 - Funds leveraged (H-GAC): \$1,591,001 + GNMD match: \$397,800
 Total Funds: \$1,988,801
- Intergovernmental Partnerships with METRO, the City of Houston and Harris County Precinct 2 has increased project funding to \$6,712,762.
- Starting construction by 2023.






Figure 48 A transit plaza is recommended on top of the North Main Street tunnel.

Pedestrian/Transit Access Master Transportation Plan

Completed in 2013:

- Allowed us to apply for Federal Grants for transportation improvements.
- Documented pedestrian and transit infrastructure along 11 corridors throughout GNMD.
- First grant awarded in October 2015 for Quitman Pedestrian-Transit Improvements.

Greater Northside Management District Pedestrian/Transit Access Master Plan

Cavalcade Street - Airline Drive to Irvington Boulevard (1.26 miles) 37 block face



Cavalcade is an east-west, two-way arterial that runs throughout the district. There is a similar mix of commercial and residential land uses as on Crosstimbers. Sidewalks and driveways are in Good or Fair condition with better conditions near IH 45 and Fulton Street. A few block faces will need minimal improvements, while other, especially near Atriline Drive, will need more extensive improvements. Cube are generally in Good condition. Planting strips are in Fair condition. Several drainage and overgrowth issues occur along the corridor. Corridor lacks pedestrians-oriented lighting.

Recommendations: Improve pedestrian infrastructure on corridors that have failing


